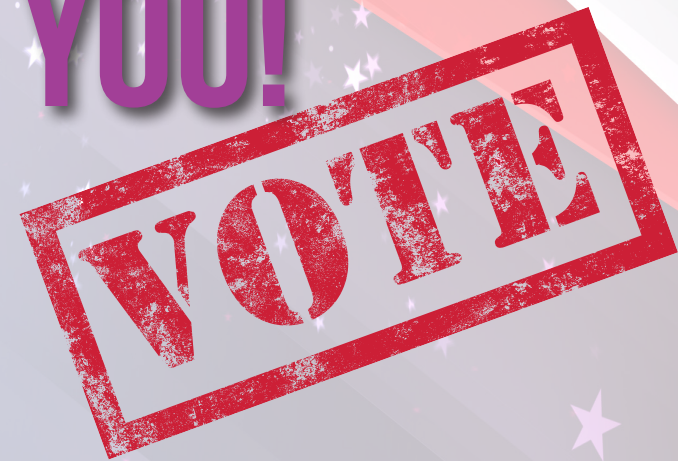

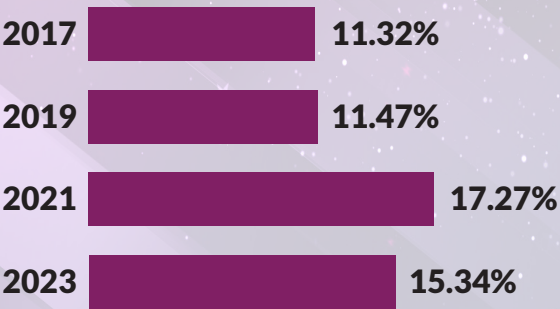

WHY VOTE LOCAL?

Municipal and school board elections (city elections) have a more immediate impact on your day-to-day life than statewide and national elections. Your elected officials at the city level make decisions and policies that directly affect you and your family, your quality of life, and your community.

Local governments are responsible for:

- **Budget & Taxation:** spending priorities & property taxes
- **Utilities:** water-quality, aquifer protection, electricity reliability, utility rates, extreme weather readiness
- **Transportation:** traffic flow, streetlights, street repair, public transportation
- **Public Safety & Law Enforcement:** staffing levels, accountability, neighborhood safety, fire department
- **Sustainability:** preparation for the impact of climate change
- **Accessibility & Inclusion:** programs and services, ADA compliance
- **Extreme Weather Impact:** communications, emergency response, city preparedness
- **Equity:** affordable and secure housing, broadband access, & economic development
- **Education:** district policies, budget and taxes

If these issues or any others are of concern, you can use the power of your vote to shape what happens in your community.

What can be decided in a local election?

- Races for mayor and city council members
- Local referendums and propositions
- Charter amendments
- Position recalls
- City bond measures
- Utility district measures/boards
- School bond measures
- School Board trustee elections
- Special Elections as needed

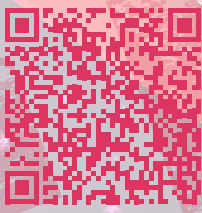
