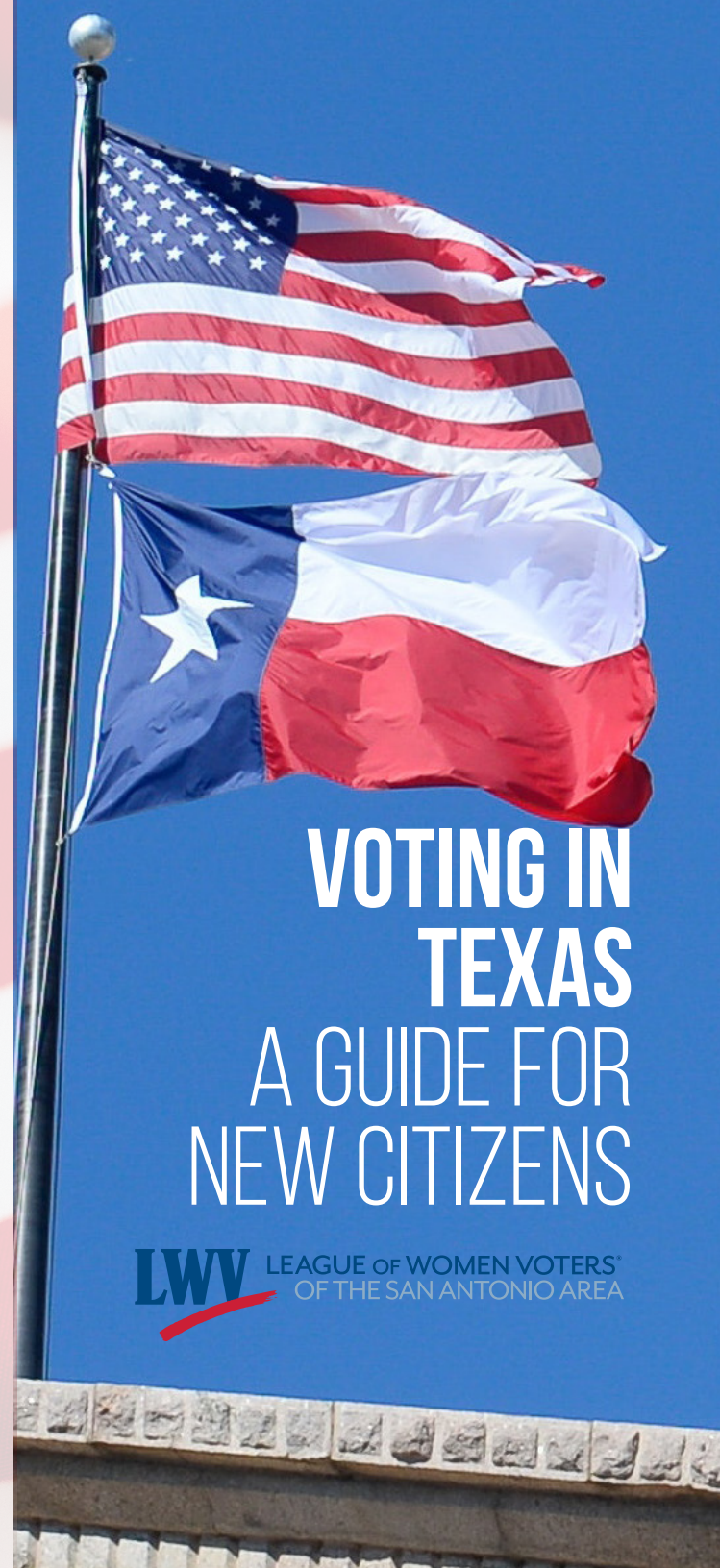

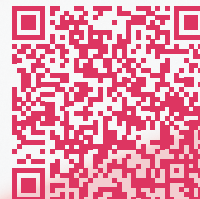


IMPORTANT FACTS ABOUT VOTING IN TEXAS

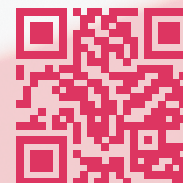
- ✔ Elections are run by county elections officials. Check with your county for the specifics of where and when to vote.
- ✔ There is no online voter registration in Texas. First time voters may download and fill out the form online but must print it, sign it, and mail it to the county elections office. Printed voter registration forms are also available at all public libraries.
- ✔ Texans must be registered to vote 30 days prior to an election to be able to vote in that election.
- ✔ Voters do not register for any political party, but can only vote in one party's primary election.
- ✔ Voters must update their voter registration if they move or have a name change. Update or check status online at votetexas.gov.
- ✔ Voting by mail is restricted to those over 65, sick or disabled, pregnant and due to deliver within 3 weeks of the election, out of the county during early voting and election day, or incarcerated but otherwise eligible to vote. Deadlines for the application process can be found at votetexas.gov.
- ✔ Early voting, a period of days prior to election day, is recommended and available for all registered voters.
- ✔ Voters must show a photo ID at the polls in order to vote. Acceptable picture ID includes one of the following: Texas Driver License, Texas Election Identification Certificate, Texas Personal Identification Card, Texas License to carry a handgun, US military ID card, US citizenship certificate, or a US passport. If you do not have any of these IDs, check with votetexas.gov for more information.
- ✔ Voters cannot use personal electronic devices at the polling site. Voters may refer to notes made on paper. You must remove all papers when you leave the booth.
- ✔ You are allowed to vote if you are already in line when the polls close.
- ✔ Voters have the right to receive up to two replacement ballots if you make a mistake and spoil your ballot before you cast your ballot.
- ✔ When voting, you have the right to request assistance from a poll worker or anyone of your choice except your employer, an officer of your union or their representatives.
- ✔ You have the right to vote if you cannot read or write. You have the right to bring an interpreter with you who can translate.
- ✔ Voters with disabilities should contact their county election office to determine where curbside voting is available.

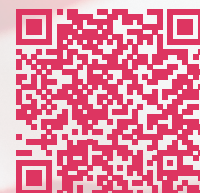
